

# Renting a Stroller at Walt Disney World

When our children were young, and we visited Walt Disney World, a stroller was an absolute must. Up until our twins were 4 and our daughter was 6, we had a stroller for them at Walt Disney World. It is a lot of walking for those little legs, and Disney is a much different level of walking! Also, having a stroller makes it easier to keep track of your children, and to get from one side of the park to the other at a faster pace.

I found that the Disney Parks strollers were uncomfortable and a pain to push. So, we rented one from [Kingdom Strollers](#). They are fantastic! If you are considering a rental, you should check them out. They will deliver right to your Disney Resort on arrival day, and then you leave your stroller with Bell Services and they come and pick it up when you are finished with it.

Often, your stroller will not be in the same place you parked it before enjoying an attraction. Cast Members will adjust all of the strollers and move them around, so it's a good idea to decorate your stroller or make it stand out in some way.

Below are some ideas on how to make your stroller stand out!

- Buy a balloon! You know those giant Mickey Mouse shaped balloons or the ones with Mickey or Minnie on it? Tie it to your stroller bar handles!
- Wrap your handle bar with ribbon or a scarf! You can bring bright colored ribbon or a scarf from home and wrap around the handle bar! This is a sure way to make sure it's your stroller and have it stand out among others!
- Buy stickers and let your child decorate the canopy! It's also something to keep them busy while in line!
- Print out a stroller sign! Personalize it with your family name, that way you can easily recognize it! Just Google "Printable Disney Stroller Signs", and you will have tons of options to choose from!
